

IMMORALITY. – Emma Quinn and Emily Prime, stated to be respectively 20 and 18 years of age, were brought up on the following charge. – P.c. Williamson said he was on duty on Park-side between 12 and 1 o'clock that morning; saw the two girls and two Universitymen get into a stable window in Parker-street. The premises belong to Emmanuel College, and the window is about 9 feet from the ground. One Universityman got up, unfastened the window, and pulled the girls up, while the other pushed from below, and then got up himself. As soon as assistance could be obtained, he got up into the loft, and there found the girls, but the men had escaped by a fanlight above the door into Emmanuel garden. About £1 7s. were found on one girl, and 1s. 7d. on the other. In order to allow time for the discovery of the gownsmen, and in order that the girls' parents might be in attendance, they were remanded until Saturday (this day).

IMMORALITY. – The two girls, Emily Prime and Emma Quinn, remanded from Thursday, on the charge of immoral conduct with two Universitymen, on the night of Wednesday, the 2nd inst., in a stable adjoining Emmanuel College, were again brought up. The Universitymen had not been discovered, but the mothers of the girls were in attendance, and each one was cautioned against letting their daughters be out at that time of night. – The MAYOR said as there was no evidence the girls would be discharged.
